The death of your child is probably the most traumatic, life-changing event that you will ever experience. The Compassionate Friends is an organization of parents who have also lost a child to death. Each of us has experienced the deep, searing pain that you are feeling now. Each of us has turned to other parents who were farther into their grief journey for guidance, support and understanding. This is done through our monthly meetings, our newsletter, our website, our Telephone Friend program, our library and our e-mail program. Each month parents find our meeting to be a safe place where they can talk about their pain and problems with others who are uniquely qualified to understand; bereaved parents offer gentle suggestions or often simply listen. We invite you to bring a friend to your first few meetings until you feel a level of comfort with the group. Do not be surprised if we talk about the happy times with our children, the wonderful memories and the various methods we have created to keep our children close to us. It is here that many bereaved parents find hope as those who are more seasoned in their grief shine the light of experience to help illuminate each grief path. We have no dues. We are self-sustaining through donations and the generosity of so many in our community. You Need Not Walk Alone.

Worldwide Candle Lighting

Held annually the second Sunday in December, this year December 9, 2012, The Compassionate Friends Worldwide Candle Lighting unites family and friends around the globe in lighting candles for one hour to honor and remember children who have died at any age from any cause. As candles are lit at 7 p.m. local time, creating a virtual wave of light, hundreds of thousands of persons commemorate and honor the memory of children in a way that transcends all ethnic, cultural, religious, and political boundaries.

Now believed to be the largest mass candle lighting on the globe, the Worldwide Candle Lighting, a gift to the bereavement community from The Compassionate Friends, creates a virtual 24-hour wave of light as it moves from time zone to time zone. Hundreds of formal candle lighting events are held and thousands of informal candle lightings are conducted in homes as families gather in quiet remembrance of children who have died, but will never be forgotten.





So Many Children

This past month I had the opportunity to visit my brother in Oklahoma City. One of the items on my agenda was to visit the Murrah Federal Building site which is now known as the Oklahoma National Memorial which also houses the Museum.

It was a beautiful day to visit with temperatures in the low 80's and a slight breeze moving through the city. The Memorial site was quiet and peaceful with not much more than the sound of the trickling water within the Reflecting Pool which set the mood for the surrounding area; calm and serene.

It was only upon viewing the Field of Empty Chairs that the real impact registered of the horrific tragedy that took place there on April 19, 1995. Lined in nine rows, each representing one of the floors of the building, the 168 chairs stand as a tribute to each person that died that day in the bombing. The smaller chairs a symbol of the 19 children killed that day.





And yet we as grieving parents know all too well that each person who died that day was some ones child, somebody's baby. Death is indiscriminate when age is concerned and it doesn't make a difference when we've lost our child.

Framed between two "Gates" marking the moment before the bomb exploded (9:01 at the East Gate) and the time it was all finished (9:03 at the West Gate), the Memorial site tries to freeze the events of that minute which changed our country much the same way the death of our sons and daughters are frozen forever in our minds.

The citizens of Oklahoma City chose to pay tribute to and honor those killed that day by building a beautiful memorial for their loved ones which everyone may come and see and remember in beauty rather than wallow in the hurt and pain and ugliness of what happened that awful day in their city.

We don't have to hold on to the horrible moment of our child passing, instead we can frame their life with all the beautiful, happy moments that their living gave you. Honor them, remember them, cherish them, love them forever.
